But you & he can't do it all
alone. Try to get as many

as possible of the introductory

essays written by Volunteer Consultants
at the ~~the~~ University & elsewhere.

Your impression of Richmond
confirms my own.

What follows is confidential,
to be used at your discretion (if
you should be discussing the situation

with Max Sandz, you could speak

frankly to him) : — It appears that

Mr. Lawrence has written an excited letter to Senator Norris in Washington attacking me. Among other things he says that Miss S. is threatening to commit suicide. In consequence another field supervisor, Joseph Gaer, is being sent to Nebraska in my place. So I don't know when I shall see you again.

But I hope you will continue to keep me somewhat informed. ~~Any~~ I want to see a good Guide written for Nebraska, — that's all. Besides that I have pleasant personal recollections of yourself.
